## Dr. Jean Dodd's NEW vaccine protocol - PERMISSION TO CROSSPOST

Dr. W. Jean Dodd's vaccination protocol is now being adopted by ALL 27 North American veterinary schools. I highly recommend that you read this. Copy and save it to your files. The veterinary schools are now going to be teaching that over-vaccination of pets (once a year "boosters") is only not unnecessary, but in some cases can be harmful or deadly! It has information for both dogs and cats. There still is an ongoing study regarding the Rabies vaccine. Most states now allow (reluctantly) 3 year Rabies, but the study is collecting data on whether or not even that may be too much. They are looking at 8 or 10 year Rabies! I hope you all stop having yearly boosters for your pets. If you're concerned with immune levels, have the vet run a Titer test.

THEN and only then, if the levels are below acceptable, should you have a booster. After all, when is the last time you had a "booster" for smallpox, or whooping cough, or anything else you had shots for as a child? Immune systems work the same in all mammals, and the concept that pets have to have yearly shots doesn't make any more sense than if you had have shots every year. If mammals immune systems were that weak in fending off these things, all of them, us included, would have been extinct years ago!

### VACCINATION NEWS FLASH

I would like to make you aware that all 27 veterinary schools in North America are in the process of changing their protocols for vaccinating dogs and cats. Some of this information will present an ethical & economic challenge to vets, and there will be skeptics. Some org the immune system. A series of vaccinations is given starting at 8 weeks and given 3-4 weeks apart up to 16 weeks of age. Another vaccination given sometime after 6 months of age (usually at 1 year 4 months) will provide lifetime immunity.

### CURRENT RECOMMENDATIONS FOR DOGS

Distemper & Parvo \*"According to Dr. Schultz, AVMA, 8-15-95, when a vaccinations series given at 2, 3 & 4 months and again at 1 year with MLV, puppies and kitten program memory cells that survive for life, providing lifelong immunity." Dr. Carmichael at Cornell and Dr. Schultz has studies showing immunity against challenge at 2-10 years for canine distemper & 4 years for parvovirus. Studies for longer duration are pending. "There are no new strains of parvovirus as one manufacturer would like to suggest. Parvovirus vaccination provides ross immunity for all types." Hepatitis (Adenovirus) is one of the agents known to be a cause of kennel cough. Only vaccines with CAV-2 should be used as CAV-1 vaccines carry the risk of "hepatitis blue-eye" reactions & kidney damage.

\*Bordetella Parainfluenza: Commonly called "Kennel cough". Vaccination for this is recommended only for those dogs boarded, groomed, taken to dog shows, or for any reason housed where exposed to a lot of dogs. The intranasal vaccine provides more complete and more rapid onset of immunity with less chance of reaction. Immunity requires 72 hours and does not protect from every cause of kennel cough. Immunity is of short duration (4 to 6 months).\*

\*Lyme disease-Lyme disease is a tick born disease which can cause lameness, kidney failure and heart disease in dogs. Ticks can also transmit the disease to humans. The original Ft. Dodge killed bacteria has proven to be the most effective vaccine. Lyme disease prevention should emphasize early removal of ticks. Amitraz collars are more effective than Top Spot, as amitraz paralyzes the tick's mouthparts preventing transmission of disease.

### \*\*VACCINATIONS NOT RECOMMENDED\*\*

Multiple components in vaccines compete with each other for the immune system and result in lesser immunity for each individual disease as well as increasing the risk of a reaction. Canine Corona Virus is only a disease of puppies. It is rare, self limiting (dogs get well in 3 days without treatment). Cornell & Texas A&M have only diagnosed one case each in the last 7 years. Corona virus does not cause disease in adult dogs.\*

\*Leptospirosis vaccine is a common cause of adverse reactions in dogs. Most of the clinical cases of leptospirosis reported in dogs in the US are caused by serovars (or types) grippityphosa and bratsilvia. The vaccines contain different serovars eanicola and icthohemorrhagica. Cross protection is not provided and protection is short lived. Lepto vaccine is immuno-suppressive to puppies less than 16 weeks.

## Connecticut Dog Federation (CDF) Report

This year's regular legislative session of the General Assembly adjourned on June 8. Of the thirty-five dog-related bills that were introduced into committees, four survived the legislative process and were signed into law by Governor Malloy:

H.B. 5008 (Public Act 11-182) An Act Concerning the Quarantine of Biting Guide Dogs. Signed on July 13; effective date October 1. This act exempts a guide dog owned or in the custody and control of a blind person, or a person with a mobility impairment, from quarantine requirements when it bites or attacks an individual, provided that the dog is currently vaccinated and is subject to routine veterinary care.

H.B. 5368 (Public Act 11-187) An Act Extending Certain Pet Shop Licensing Requirements to Persons and Organizations that Import Animals for Adoption. Signed on July 13; effective date October 1. This act establishes, for the first time, licensure requirements for persons and organizations that engage in the business of importing animals into the state for adoption, sale or transfer. "Business" applies whether the activities are for-profit or not-for-profit. Animal importers that offer animals to pet shops licensed in accordance with existing statutes will not be affected.

Apprehension has been expressed by some CDF members regarding this bill. If the state Dept. of Agriculture decides that it applies to activities by dog club rescue groups, it would be a stretch that "this bill would make it unaffordable for rescue groups to sell rescue animals, even as a donation" as stated by one member. These are the new requirements:

1. \$100.00 per year to register the rescue organization.
2. Disclosure of all animals imported from out-of-state sources during the prior year, with the state or country of origin reported for each animal (this information must be included in the application to register).
3. Within 48 hours of importing an animal, and every 90 days thereafter until it is adopted, sold or transferred, have the animal examined by a state licensed veterinarian. An examination by a state licensed veterinarian will be required not more than 15 days prior to adoption, sale or transfer of the animal (the 48-hour or 90-day examination will satisfy this requirement if it falls within the 15 days).
4. Records of veterinary services will be required to be retained for three years.
5. The existing statutory requirement for providing a certificate of health (and current rabies vaccination if three months of age or older) for an animal imported for sale will be expanded to include those imported for adoption or transfer.

The only significant costs possibly imposed by this legislation will be the annual registration fee and the additional veterinarian examinations required. Reputable rescue groups already have veterinary examinations for animals as they are received, and they maintain records of those costs.

It does not appear that the additional costs to a reputable dog club or rescue organization (registration and veterinarian fees) will cause a significant hardship. It will be worth those costs to give the Dept of Agriculture some teeth for attacking the present deplorable importation of dogs with undisclosed diseases and physical ailments to the detriment of state residents and animals.

Four representatives and seven senators joined Rep. Brian Hurlburt as co-sponsors of this bill. The House vote was 143 Yea, 2 Nay; the Senate vote was 36 Yea, 0 Nay.

H.B. 6226 (Public Act 11-194) An Act Concerning Cross-Reporting of Child Abuse and Animal Cruelty. Signed on July 13; effective date October 1. This act requires the Department of Agriculture and the Department of Children and Families (DCF) to share/exchange information reported by animal control officers and employees of the DCF pertaining to an animal that has been harmed, neglected or treated cruelly in the course of their investigations. It also provides for: 1) the training of DCF employees concerning the identification of harm, neglect and cruelty toward animals and the relationship of such to child welfare case practice, and 2) the training of ACOs concerning the accurate and prompt identification and reporting of child abuse and neglect.

## DCF Report Continued

H.B. 6303 (Public Act 11-111) An Act Concerning the Treatment of Ill and Injured Animals in Municipal Animal Shelters. Signed on July 8; effective date October 1. This act permits a municipal or regional dog pound to enter into a contract with one or more public or private animal rescue organizations for payment by such organization(s) for treatment by a licensed veterinarian of injured, sick or diseased animals impounded at that facility. The contract must provide that no costs associated with that treatment will accrue to the municipality or region. The ACO in charge will be required to notify the contracted organization(s) of the need for treatment as determined by him or notification of such need by another municipal employee or volunteer. The contracted organization will have twenty-four hours after notification to provide treatment by a licensed veterinarian of its choice.

The existing requirement for advertising of unidentified animals in local newspapers will be changed to allow advertising also in newspapers with state-wide circulation. A requirement has been added that a photograph or description of an animal and its termination date for legal impoundment be posted on a national pet finder web site or a web site maintained by the ACO and accessible to the public through an Internet search.

## MA to Consider Changes to Kennel Definition on July 19

A Massachusetts legislative committee will consider a bill on July 19 to significantly change the definition of kennel to encompass training facilities or any dog event with more than 12 dogs. All those meeting the new criteria would be required to comply with all state and local licensing and other regulations currently reserved just for large kennels.

Responsible dog owners and trainers are encouraged to attend the July 19 hearing and to contact the Joint Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure to express concerns with this legislation. *Scroll down for hearing and contact information.*

### Summary:

[House Bill 1023](#) would change the definition of kennel to exempt “daytime only services such as dog grooming, dog training, supervised playtime and dog walking with no more than twelve dogs on a single premises.” While the AKC appreciates the sponsor’s attempt to exempt certain services, the bill actually expands the definition to include activities and services that are not currently considered a kennel. This would mean that any daytime activity where more than twelve dogs are present (including dog shows, training facilities, companion events, etc.) would now be considered a kennel and required to comply with all state and local kennel licensing and regulations.

**From the South:** Take your best route to I-91 heading north out of Hartford, CT. Take Exit 42 (Route 159/Windsor Locks). Turn left at light at end of ramp, then follow straight onto Route 159 North. Suffield Veterinary Hospital will be on the left in about 3 ¼ miles.

**From the North:** Take your best route to I-91 heading South out of Springfield, MA. Take Exit 47W (Route 190W/Suffield). After crossing the river, turn left at the light onto East St/Route 159. Suffield Veterinary Hospital is on the right in about 1 ½ miles. Do not be confused by the street numbers as they first descend, then ascend again as you drive down East St.

**From the West:** Take your best route to I-91 heading north out of Hartford, CT or south out of Springfield, MA and follow directions above. Or, take Route 20E out of Granby, CT. Turn left at East Granby center onto Route 187N. At the stop sign, go straight onto Sheldon St. At the next stop sign, turn right onto Mountain Rd, Route 168. At the light, turn right and then an immediate left at the next light onto Bridge St. Follow Bridge St to the end, turn right onto East St/Route 159. Suffield Veterinary Hospital is about 1 mile on the right.

**From the East:** Take your best route to I-91 heading North out of Hartford, CT or South out of Springfield, MA, and follow directions above. Or, follow Route 190 heading west out of Stafford Springs, CT through Enfield, and across the river into Suffield. Turn left at the light onto East St/Route 159.
